

#### OCCUPATIONS

by Vita Brevis Paraphrased by Gail Platt

As you are checking your ancestor's names, ages, and those important facts listed on records, be sure to check the details that can make your ancestor unique. Such as an occupation. It may be the brick wall breaker that will identify the difference

between two men with the same name.

As you study the occupation, ask yourself if the locality supports the occupation with the services available in the area. Towns generally include occupations as grocers, shoemakers, watchmakers and bakers.

When your ancestors moved about, occupational migration patterns may be noticed. Trappers, hunters and restless spirits were first to areas, then were followed by farmers, tillers of the soil, blacksmiths, coopers, and other crafts and tradesmen. Lastly, tavern keepers would be found where roads or canals were.

Also knowing your ancestor's occupation can assist with your cluster research. Your ancestor's occupation can identify their associates such as a rope builder with ship building, or sail makers. A grocer to wholesalers, and blacksmith may have associated with carriage makers and wheelwrights.

Some occupations create more records for one to search and review. Such as railroad men, or canal builders. Possibly in their written histories you may find additional information.

If you are wondering where to find occupations, they can be found in the US Federal Census from 1850's onward for each member of the family.

Here is a list of other items that can be used to find your ancestor's occupations; town clerk registers that include birth, marriage and death records, City Directories from early 1800's that include head of household's name, occupation and address, passenger lists that include the name, age, country of origin, destination and occupation.

During the late nineteenth century forward, obituaries will tell of deceased's life work. Before then, it would just be a brief notice of death. Military records may include the occupation, as space is provided.

Newspapers can provide articles about your ancestor and their occupation, or an advertisement regarding the announcement of goods or services for sale.

Older occupation titles may be defunct. So you will need to decode your occupation. Decoding tools would be Barbara Evan's book *A to Zax*, and websites such as *FamilyResearch* and *Hall Genealogy*.

This is a major security breach. An online company that allows users to obtain a copy of their birth and death certificates from U.S. state governments has exposed a massive cache of applications — including their personal information.



More than 752,000 applications for copies of birth certificates were found on an Amazon Web Services (AWS) storage bucket. The bucket, owned by a Barcelona-based company <u>Onlinevitalus</u>, wasn't protected with a password, allowing anyone who knew the easy-to-guess web address access to the data.

The data exposed was for **APPLICATIONS** for birth certificate copies, not for copies of the birth certificates themselves. Even so, each application contained a lot of personal information that is not supposed to be exposed, including: the applicant's name, date-of-birth, current home address, email address, phone number and historical personal information, including past addresses, names of family members and the reason for the application — such as applying for a passport or researching family history.

#### Push Buttons and Party Lines

Telephone Technology Newspapers.com article Paraphrased by Gail Platt

It was November 18, 1963 when Bell Telephone introduced the push button telephone to the public. But not before President John F Kennedy activated a countdown clock in

the spring of 1963 for the New York World's Fair with a push button phone! It was to activate the clock to open the fair in 1964. No more rotary dial phones were on the latest achievement of the telephone.

Alexander Graham Bell's first patent for the phone was in 1876. Bell and his colleague Thomas Watson, was able to talk for 30 minutes from 2 miles apart which shocked the world! The invention converted sound into electric pulses that traveled through wire, connecting the two phones.

It wasn't feasible to stretch wire to each telephone, so a telephone exchange (a telephone switchboard) was developed. To place a call, the caller would turn a crank on the home phone which connected you to an Operator. The Operator would see a light from the caller on the switchboard, then a wire jack plug would connect you and the Operator. The Operator would ask who you needed to reach, then connect another wire jack to the person you are wishing to reach. An electrical current would go down the line and make the telephone on the other end make a sound with a bell.

Operators worked with a small group of customers. They often knew each one. One creative mother in 1903 discovered a new use for the telephone. The Mother left the receiver off the phone and requested to the Operator to call her at a neighbor's house when she heard her sleeping baby woke up.

An Operator might, on any day, help save a life or soothe a frightened child. "Rose Coppinger was an operator in Webber Falls, Oklahoma in 1914. When a fire raged through town, she refused to leave her post at the telephone exchange and warned neighbors of the approaching flames."

Ten million telephones were in use by 1918 in the United States. The rotary dials were the norm. At a lower cost, party lines were used. A party line is where more than one user could hear a conversation already in progress. Now let me share that a party line had an etiquette of never listening to another's conversation. It did present challenges during emergencies, and tragedies occurred if the phone line was not yielded during a crisis. Woodbury, Connecticut had the last operating party line shutting down in 1991

#### ITALIANS STUDY CITIZENSHIP - Weed, Cal., March 25.

Eighty Italians of this place have formed a naturalization club for the purpose of becoming American citizens at the earliest date possible. The club is a school of instruction that will educate applicants for naturalization is the fundamental principles of government, so that when the time comes they can pass the examinations.

So many applications for citizenship have been made before County Clerk Nelson, in Yreka, CA., he has been compelled to wire to Washington for more blanks. It is almost certain that on the next naturalization day 300 Italians of Siskiyou county will renounce allegiance to the king of Italy to become citizens of the United States.

January 05, 1901, Image 9, column 9 (Chronicling America) Translated by Gail Platt

SIX FEET OF SNOW - Heaviest Fall Ever Known Reported at Yreka, Cal-YREKA, Cal., Jan. 4

The snowstorm has passed all previous records, 72 inches having fallen since Thursday evening, and it is still snowing furiously. Buildings are falling in under the tremendous weight.

North and southbound trains, engines and snow plows, are snowed in the different places in the country on the line of the railroad.

The Fort Jones and Etna stage has been out since yesterday morning trying to come a distance of eighteen miles, and it is feared that the passengers and driver are helpless in the Scott Valley mountains.

Two hundred and twenty-five excursionists from the county and as many more from Southern Oregon and other points are in San Francisco, unable to return on account of the blockade.

#### TWO BOYS BLOWN UP.

YREKA, Cal. Aug 20 -

Two boys were killed and another was probably fatally injured when powder house No. 1, belonging to the Grant Powder company, was blown up. In nearly every business house in Yreka windows were broken. Remnants of clothing and parts of bodies found on a hill indicate that two boys were blown to atoms. Bert Holland was found twenty-five yards from the powder house with his face lacerated and two holes in the temple, evidently cause by flying stones. Two damaged rifles were found near the bodies. It is supposed that the boys shot into the powder house through a ventilator.

#### BORES FOR WATER, OPENS GOLD MINE

YREKA, (Siskiyou Co., Cal.), Aug 3 - Finding a promising ledge of gold as well as a splendid supply of water is the good fortune if Louis Scheld, a prominent landowner near this city. Scheld when he commenced boring for artesian water expected to find both gold and water and the result proves that his theories were correst. He has not found artesian water but expect to have enough to irrigate several hundred acres of land.

Scheld for years has believed that artesian water could be found in Siskiyou county and made offers to anyone that would bore for it. No one accepted his offers he decided to bore for himself. From the first he encountered difficulties in the way of inability to obtain competent help and in the necessary delays of sending to San Francisco for parts of machinery for repairs.

Thursday at the depts of 360 feet he struck a gold bearing ledge with borings showing free gold. Yesterday Scheld reached the depth of 400 feet and was on the ledge as the borings continued to show gold.

The water in the well is within twenty feet of the surface and if Scheld does not find artesian water he has a flow sufficient to irrigate several hundred acres. He will dig deeper in the hope of finding artesian water.

The ore drillings are being assayed and the result is awaited with much interest by mining men who claim that the hills near Yreka carried gold from the surface to a depth of 200 feet but the finding of free gold at a depth of 400 feet demonstrates to the miner and investor that treasures of gold deep in ground are in the hills of Siskiyou.

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# THE CITIZEN-REPUBLICAN - SCOTLAND, BON HOMME CO., S.D. DEC 14, 1905, Column 2 (Chronicling America) Translated by Gail Platt

KILLED IN PRIZE FIGHT Fatal End of a Bout for Purse and Gate Receipts in California Yreka, Cal., Dec 12 -

Jack McDonald, a laborer at Weed and champion of the locality, was killed in a fistic contest Wednesday night by Sid Roberts. The two men made arrangements for a ten-round bout for the gate receipts and a small purse, but from the third round Roberts had everything his own way.

In the ninth, when McDonald was all but gone, Roberts swung a vicious left to the back of McDonald's head, dropping him to the floor. McDonald did not regain consciousness and he died yesterday. The doctor pronounced death due to a hemorrhage of the brain. One hundred men saw the contest.

Roberts is now in jail, held for murder.

#### THE DAILY MORNING ASTORIAN - ASTORIA, OR

May 20, 1894, Image 1 (Chronicling America) Translated by Gail Platt

AN INNOCENT MAN CHARGED WITH THE MURDER OF HIS WIFE AND DAUGHTER -Yreka, Cal., May 19 - The cloud which has hung over Geo. Decker, the Yreka Rancher, for two weeks was cleared up today by the arrival of his wife and daughter, who he was accused of murdering years ago. The case is a most remarkable one. Twentyseven years ago Decker's wife and young daughter left Yreka, and shortly afterwards he obtained a divorce. About two weeks ago some boys found a heap of bones in the cave near Decker's place, and the citizens of the community jumped to the conclusion that they were the remains of Decker's wife and baby, who had disappeared 27 years ago. Decker could not prove that they were not, as all those who had seen his wife depart from Yreka were dead. He was arrested and accused of murdering nearly every person in the vicinity of Yreka who had died suddenly or had disappeared for a number of years. The murders charged to him by the credulous citizens amount to ten and he was looked upon by his neighbors as a monster of iniquity. Totally ignorant of Decker's peril, his wife and daughter arrived at Yreka today and Decker was discharged from custody. Both he and his wife had married again and raised families, and tonight a family reunion was held, at which Decker's escape from his peril was celebrated.
